We are looking like we are in good shape financially on this project! It is projected that all the Refugees will have placement and leave Fort McCoy by February 11. 2022 NCCWSL Conference:

Few of us know that the acronym **NCCWSL** means **National Conference for College Women Student Leaders**. However, we definitely do know what it stands for: the opportunity to help the next generation of equity leaders network and learn from each other!

The 2022 Conference is set for May 24-26th. It's virtual which gives us the opportunity to sponsor greater numbers of applicants. The conference will be split into a half day, the two day or bundled options.

This year AAUW Wisconsin will support at least 10 nominees by providing scholarships for their registration. We can reserve early bird slots and transfer them to selectees. Please share information about this opportunity with your college age friends, neighbors, family and locality. Reach out and let your community know about this outstanding opportunity offered by AAUW!

This year we will add an option for candidates to apply directly via the State Website. (<u>AAUW-WI.Net</u>) This supports and recognizes local Branch efforts while making it easier to apply.

Eligible nominees must be currently enrolled in a program leading to an Associate degree (or equivalent), Bachelor's degree, or Master's degree, and they may be attending a technical college or other two or four year public or private college. Consideration will be given to every Branch's first choice applicant before considering multiple candidates from the same Branch. Minutes of the Last Meeting:



Our Branch held a ZOOM meeting on January 25, 2022 at 6:00 p.m. Participating were Julia Palmer, Deb Thiel, Dick Thiel, Sonia Olson, Ann Gerzel, Bonnie Peterson, Tammy Hewuse, Tia Hewuse, Cindy Zahrte, Deb Young. (I hope I didn't miss anyone!)

President Deb Thiel mentioned that AAUW-WI has been collecting ideas regarding recruitment to AAUW. One idea, for which there is assistance available, is to hold an event. We'd need to supply the venue and refreshments. More information regarding this idea will be shared in the months ahead.

Tina Thompson as STEM Coordinator for our Branch has suggested that we sponsor an essay contest for 8th graders, reaching out to the Tomah public and parochial schools. The essay would be about a woman in a STEM field. We discussed funding of prizes. Deb Thiel moved, seconded by Dick Thiel, that we set aside \$100 for the prize(s). Cindy Zahrte expressed support for the \$100, but as a single prize for the contest due to the amount of effort we would be

asking the students to put forth. The motion was amended to go with the \$100 and refer the detail decisions about the contest to a subcommittee. Unanimous approval.

Content for February ZOOM meeting was discussed.

A suggestion was made to have the Meat Smyth cater our annual meeting in May rather than have member provide food. Joline Powell offered to check into the options, availability and costs. We would each pay our share, as we would at a restaurant.

Julia Plamer said we need to get our nominations in for the Women's History Month recognition. <u>Cindy Zahrte will</u> <u>be able to produce the booklet provided we get everything to her no later than March 10.</u>

Cindy Zahrte and Deb Thiel attended the recent rally in La Crosse regarding gerrymandering.

Congratulations to Tia Hewuse who is in the ATC play "Always" — a tribute to Patsy Cline. Barb Sullivan and Rocky Shutter are directing. Masks are required for the performances Feb. 3-6 and Feb. 10-13.

Our program continued with Julia Palmer sharing her story. Her story began in Oklahoma City, OK where she was born. She soon moved to Grand Forks, ND, and later moved to Maryland and then to Burlington, VT as her family followed her father's career in medicine and education. With the encouragement from her mother, Julia entered into a nursing program but later decided to switch to dietetics and nutrition. She did a 2-year fellowship at Mayo in Public Health. While living in Lewisville, KY she met and married Dr. Gary Palmer who ha six children. The couple added another son to the busy family. They moved to Tomah for work at the Veteran's Administration hospital. Julia continued her work in nutrition through the VA and Monroe County until her retirement. She has also been a substitute teacher in the Tomah School District for several years.

Her advice: "Always be flexible and be aware of opportunities. Nothing is impossible!" Thank you for your long-time leadership in AAUW-Tomah Branch, Julia!

Our program continued with members sharing a synopsis of a book, movie or podcast.

<u>Ann Gerzel</u> spoke about the series she viewed on Netflix — <u>Call the Midwife</u>. Ann was impressed with the writing, well developed characters, and the hard issues covered during the series, such as polio, racism, feminism.

Bonnie Peterson reviewed the book <u>Sisters In Spirit</u>. The book explained the Haudenosaunee (Iroquois) influence on early American Feminists (Elisabeth Cady Stanton, Matila Gage, Lucretia Mott). It covers the political structure of the Six Nations Iroquois Confederacy. From this model of freedoms for and leadership by women, the early feminists drew great inspiration.

Dick Thiel spoke about the book <u>In the Land of the Grasshopper's Song</u>. It is about two New England women who make their way to California during 1908 – 1909 with the goal of change the lifestyles and beliefs of native peoples into those of the eastern whites. This autobiographical book chronicles their many and various challenges. "It's a really good read," says Dick.

Deb Thiel spoke about the book **First Women**, published in April 2016. The book uses well-written stories to explain how women have viewed their roles in terms of their personalities and the limitations and barriers of their times. "It was interesting to compare and contrast," she said.

<u>**Tia Hewuse**</u> spoke about the <u>*Financial Feminist*</u> podcast of Tori Dunlap. Tia finds the advice on sustainable finances "very interesting." As a young woman. Tia also feels that the podcast has enlightened her on making investments and breaks myths associated with financial issues.

<u>Cindy Zahrte</u> spoke about the book <u>Gusty Women</u> by Chelsea Clinton and Hillary Rodham Clinton. It contains short biographies a variety of outstanding "gutsy" women who have asked the tough questions and inspired the authors.

Deb Young shared an experience with her 83-year-old mother in Green Bay. Deb retired at the end of December, so when her mother fell just before Christmas, Deb was thankful to be able to spend time with her (especially after learning she needs a heart valve replacement. Together, they watched **1883**, a western about how families left all they knew to move "out West." Deb felt that their discussions of what it would be like to go through those experiences and the intergenerational sharing of perspectives with her mother was a wonderful experience. The importance of connecting in this way with her mother was very rewarding.

<u>Sonia Olson</u> has spent some time_reviewing the AAUW National website. She spoke about several things she learned by becoming more familiar with the new website. This included the change from International Federation of University Women (IFUW) to Graduate Women International (GWI). GWI continues to advocate for women. She suggested visiting the website **WG-USA.org** to see the organization's goals and how this parallels AAUW.

Tammy Hewuse told us about the book <u>The Moment of Lift</u> by Melinda Gates. It is about how we can lift each other up, thus lifting up ourselves in the process. "This help society turn hierarchy into equality," said Tammy. "If you want to lift up humanity, empower women. Nothing else can improve the world more." The book also covers the author's view on family planning and contraception across the world, focusing on how it creates unequal justice in cultures that see women just existing for the pleasure of men and their role as care takers of children.

<u>Julia Palmer</u> reviewed Michael Lewis's 2021 book called <u>The Premonition</u>. It's the story of a pandemic, the censured news out of China, and the impact on public health. "The development of the characters in the book is fascinating," said Julia.
